



More Powers For Magistrates

Post court road safety interventions for convicted traffic offenders are welcomed by the TTC Group, recognised specialists in driver education programmes.

The Road Safety Bill completed its passage through Parliament and received Royal assent on 8th November 2006. This will allow new driver educational courses to be developed in the future.

The new courses will be another option for magistrates when sentencing motorists for an offence that may result in the loss of their driving licence. This involves offences of careless and inconsiderate driving, failure to comply with traffic signs, breaking the speed limit or breaches of motorway regulations.

It will be the fourth education initiative promoted by the Government following on from drink drive, speed awareness and driver improvement courses.

"The model for the new course could be based on those offered to drink drive offenders,"

said Graham Wynn OBE, director of the award winning TTC Group which is the UK's largest provider of drink drive courses praised for reducing re-offending rates.

"We applaud the Government for this action which will increase magistrates' powers in dealing with motoring offenders. It is another proactive step in the right direction towards reducing the death and injury toll on our roads – which is the ultimate aim of the TTC Group."

TTC also runs the National Driver Improvement Scheme in Kent and is operationally prepared to provide speed awareness courses throughout the UK. Despite being recommended nationally by police chiefs, speed awareness courses are currently only available in a few areas.

Magistrates' Conference

The Magistrates Association Conference 2007 in Manchester on May 12 has a wide variety of driving topics on the agenda.

Have None 4 The Road And Much More is the title for the event at Salford University which will be introduced by TTC Group Director Graham Wynn OBE.

Expert witness Bob Jackson will start the first session with a health warning followed later in the day with a workshop on accident scene investigation.

Dr Rob Tunbridge will talk about drug driving and TTC's National Training Manager Malcolm Jones will discuss Police Diversionary Schemes and the speed awareness programme.

The value of driver education will be the issue for JP Elliott Griffiths, a member of the MA Road Traffic Committee.

Up to date information on police roadside testing and impairment tests will be discussed by TTC's Development Manager John Price while Traffic Commissioner Beverley Bell will relate her role and responsibilities.

The drink drive update from TTC will include alcohol units, absorption and elimination and driving the next day.

"It promises to be a very full



and interesting day with formal presentations and workshops which will keep magistrates up to date on the latest driving issues," said Mr Wynn.

TTC TOPS 10,000

TTC topped the 10,000 mark for convicted drivers attending a rehabilitation course in 2006. The figure is a record high – up 10% - reflecting repeated TTC efforts to follow up referrals from magistrates.

End of year figures reveal that a record 10,165 successfully completed a training course – up 902 on the previous year. An extra 31 courses were introduced to cope with the increase in demand.

TTC is the main provider of courses educating one third of all those convicted of a drink driving offence in the UK.

aimed at cutting petty thefts in the workplace, and a beer mat publicity project to raise awareness for the Crimestoppers phone number.

They have launched numerous publicity campaigns such as the one to convince people to write down their personalised imei number which, if activated, results in their mobile phone being switched off once stolen, making it useless to thieves.

Fund raising events have also been launched to finance the charity's reward system for callers.

businesses which had suffered badly from thefts and it resulted in a reduction in work related crime.

"By simply posting the Crimestoppers message and 0800 555 111 phone number on walls and doors in their factory, it gave a dramatic drop in crime.

"Thieves realised that they could and probably would be shopped by their working colleagues which subsequently resulted in a sharp drop in petty thefts. All they did was put up a few Crimestoppers posters."

DRINK DRIVE COURSE FOR MAGISTRATES

Magistrates are urging colleagues to attend alcohol seminars run by TTC in courts across the country. Over the past two years, up to 1,000 JPs have volunteered for the seminar - a summary of the 18 hour course attended by convicted drink drivers.

Magistrates said the course had improved their knowledge especially about alcohol strengths and measures.

Wigan magistrate Gwenda Thompson said: "The talk from TTC was absolutely superb. We were riveted by the information we received. It was useful in our role as magistrates as we are now better informed."

TTC manager Mel Hughes has presented 33 seminars to JP's in the north-west, Cheshire, Derbyshire and Wales. He will continue to visit courts in Merseyside, Greater Manchester, Cheshire, Leicestershire, Warwickshire, Cumbria, Nottingham, Staffordshire and the West Midlands. The training will be rolled out to reach 2,500 magistrates and senior courts staff.

STUDENTS LEARN ABOUT DRINK DRIVING

Students from Shropshire, South Wales and the south west were given lessons on the dangers of drink driving by TTC.

The sixth formers learned about alcohol units, how long alcohol stays in the body, drink

drive limits, and how binge drinking is leading to liver damage.

Magistrate Ray Soper, a Telford College lecturer, said the "excellent" course was over subscribed as soon as it was announced.

THE LOST GENERATION

A generation of young people have been "lost" to alcohol, says TTC which is calling on the Government to introduce quality education into schools and colleges.

More education about the risk of excessive drinking is essential to bring about a culture shift in young people," said Jenny Wynn.

"I do believe we have lost a generation of young people to alcohol because there hasn't been enough quality education. Alcohol is the largest drug problem facing the UK today," she said.

Strategy to Tackle Alcohol Abuse

Government departments must work together to combat the widespread problems caused by alcohol, says the TTC Group which has launched a new strategy to encourage health, transport and Home Office departments to join forces to reduce the impact of alcohol on society.

"We want to encourage the Government to see alcohol as a cross departmental issue and to tackle its effects in a co-ordinated approach. Alcohol does not just effect road safety but has serious implications on the nation's health and public safety," said Director Graham Wynn OBE.

Solutions must be found to the consequences of alcohol which had resulted in a 28.5 per cent increase in drink drive deaths over six years with more drivers killed aged 17 to 29.

"Alcohol leads to disruptive behaviour in our city centres taking police away from other duties. More needs to be done to reduce the drink drive statistics and to tackle alcohol consumption which causes health problems and results in anti social behaviour."

There also needed to be more education in schools to raise public awareness about the dangers of alcohol.

MP SHOCK AT DRINKS DEMO

Shadow Road Safety Minister Owen Paterson is calling for more public education on alcohol after witnessing a "shocking" drinks demo from TTC.

He told MPs in Parliament about his surprise at how stronger drinks are now being served in larger measures.

"It was striking to see the different sized glasses lined up and how alcohol strengths have increased," said the MP, who is advocating education for all drivers.

The MP has since invited TTC to provide information on their successful nationwide public education courses for a Green Paper he is preparing aimed at reducing the death and injury toll on UK roads.

"The TTC Group is at the forefront of alcohol education. Their demonstration was very graphic and I won't forget it," said Mr Paterson.

Moment of Madness

A policewoman lost her job, home, and ended a relationship with her partner – all due to drink driving.

The experienced traffic officer was arrested by colleagues when she crashed her car after uncharacteristically drinking a whole bottle of sherry while suffering severe stress at work.

"I've lost everything. I wish I could turn the clock back to stop one moment of madness. The drink drive course though was brilliant and everyone should go on it regardless of whether they are convicted of an offence."

Education Roadshow

TTC are educating 4,000 LGV and PSV operators in nationwide training sessions at 25 UK venues. The first, in May 2006, was attended

by 110 operators in Wakefield, the final session will be in London in March 2007.

The course covered alcohol, drugs, prescribed medicines, recreational drugs and company policies.

TTC trained 70 LGV drivers who distribute food to M&S stores in UK and Ireland. Manager Martin Macleerie said: “I would definitely recommend it.”
